Originally from Costa Rica, Christiana Figueres was born into a very political family and was inspired to work on the climate problem because of a toad! The golden toad used to be very common when Figueres was a young girl, but by the time she had children of her own, the golden toad was extinct in Costa Rica, and critically endanger around the world. This made her realise that her children were going to grow up in a world "diminished by our carelessness". Since, she has played a key role in moving us closer to fixing the problem and building a better world for everyone. One of her greatest achievements is leading the Paris Agreement in 2015 – the historic climate agreement between world governments.

- "Impossible is not a fact it is an attitude."
- "There is no way you can deliver victory without optimism."
- "We cannot ask others to do what we have not done ourselves."
- "Educating young women and empowering women to come to decision-making tables is the strongest thing that we can do for the climate. When there are more women in boardrooms and in high-level positions in institutions, you get decisions that are wiser and longer term."
