Leafy Artwork

When you are out in your local area why not collect some fallen leaves and make some cool artwork with them?

While you collect the leaves, look closely to see if you can see differences between them.

Why do you think trees and plants have leaves look and feel different?

- How many different coloured leaves can you find?
- Can you spot anything that the leaf has that could be for defence?
- Is there any evidence that an animal might have lived on or near the leaf?

Important

Be careful when picking up leaves as some may have spines or irritants that protect them from grazing animals. Use gloves if you can.





We would suggest that you only collect leaves that have fallen to avoid damaging the tree.

Trees need their leaves to capture sunlight and get energy, but they do fall off by themselves so we should try to collect those ones.

Make sure you give the leaves a gentle shake near to the ground – there might be some little creatures living in there and you don't want to take them home too!

The patterns, colours and shapes found in nature can be the best inspiration for creating beautiful artwork.

Materials needed:

- Leaves
- Plain paper
- Crayons or colouring pencils

Instructions:

1. Place the leaf under the paper with the veins facing upwards
2. Use the crayon to gently rub over the leaf – you should see the pattern appear on the paper
3. Experiment with different leaf arrangements and different colours to create lots of different pictures
